DIRECTIONS FROM PHILADELPHIA

Take the Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) West. Follow I-76 West to Route 202 South. Take Rt. 202 South to the Great Valley/Route 29 North Exit. At light at the top of the ramp Turn Right onto Swedesford Road. Follow to next light and Turn Left onto Valley Stream Parkway. Continue through the next light into the entrance of the Marriott.

DIRECTIONS FROM PHILADELPHIA AIRPORT

Take I-95 South to Route 476 North. Follow 476 North to the Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) West to Route 202 South. Take Route 202 South to the Great Valley/Route 29 North exit. At light at the top of the ramp Turn Right onto Swedesford Road. Follow to next light and Turn Left onto Valley Stream Parkway. Continue through the next light into the entrance of the Marriott.

DIRECTIONS FROM SOUTH JERSEY

Take I-95 South to Route 322 West. Take 322 West to US Route 1 South to Route 202 North. Take 202 North to the Great Valley/Route 29 North Exit. At light at the top of the ramp Turn Right onto Swedesford Road. Follow to next light and Turn Left onto Valley Stream Parkway. Continue through the next light into the entrance of the Marriott.

DIRECTIONS FROM WILMINGTON AND POINTS SOUTH

(MARYLAND, DELAWARE, WASHINGTON D.C., WEST CHESTER, PA) Take I-95 North to Route 202 North. Follow Rt. 202 North to the Great Valley/Rt. 29 North Exit. Turn right onto Rt. 29 North. At the third light Turn Left into the Marriott.

DIRECTIONS FROM NEW YORK AND POINTS NORTH

Take NJ Turnpike South to Exit 6-The Pennsylvania Turnpike Extension West. Follow Turnpike West to Exit 326 for Valley Forge. Take Route 202 South to the Great Valley/Rt. 29 North Exit. At light at the top of the ramp Turn Right onto Swedesford Road. Follow to next light and Turn Left onto Valley Stream Parkway. Continue through the next light into the entrance of the Marriott. **OR Continue on the Pennsylvania Turnpike to the new EZ-Pass Only Exit #320 which puts you directly on to Route 29. Turn Left at the bottom of the ramp at the light and continue through two lights to the Marriott on the Right.**

DIRECTIONS FROM HARRISBURG AND POINTS WEST

Take Pennsylvania Turnpike East to Exit 326 for Valley Forge. Take Route 202 South to the Great Valley/Rt. 29 North Exit. At light at the top of the ramp Turn Right onto Swedesford Road. Follow to next light and Turn Left onto Valley Stream Parkway. Continue through the next light into the entrance of the Marriott. **OR Continue on the Pennsylvania Turnpike to the new EZ-Pass Only Exit #320 which puts you directly on to Route 29. Turn Left at the bottom of the ramp at the light and continue through two lights to the Marriott on the Right.**

DIRECTIONS TO THE PONTON CONGRESS FROM THE HOTEL

Turn Left onto Route 29 out of the Marriott. Continue 1-1/2 Miles on Route 29 North and turn Right onto Whitehorse Road at the 5th Light. Continue on Whitehorse Road and the event is 300 yards on the Right past the 4-Way Stop Sign. White Mailbox #4162.

In 1906, Pierre S. du Pont purchased the Peirce Arboretum to save its trees from being cut for lumber. In its first year of operation, the Philadelphia Zoo had 813 animals and received well over 228,000 visitors. Constructed between 1732 and 1756 as the State House of the Province of Pennsylvania, it is considered a fine example of Georgian architecture. From 1775 to 1783 (except the winter of 1777 - 1778 when Philadelphia was occupied by the British Army) this

was the meeting place for the Second Continental Congress. It was in the Assembly Room of this building that George Washington was appointed commander in chief of the Continental Army in 1775 and the Declaration of Independence was adopted on July 4, 1776.

The National Constitution Center in historic Philadelphia is America's most interactive history museum. Located just two blocks from the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall, it is the only museum devoted to the U.S. Constitution and the story of *We, the people*.

The Brandywine Battlefield Historic Site brings to life the largest engagement of the Revolutionary War, fought on September 11, 1777, between the Continental Army led by General George Washington and the British forces headed by General William Howe.
